Henderson Hospital earns a TOP honor for patient care


Highlighting its nationally recognized achievements in patient safety and quality, Henderson Hospital was named a Top General Hospital by The Leapfrog Group – an award widely acknowledged as one of the most competitive honors American hospitals can receive. Only 35 general hospitals in the country received this distinction, which considered performance across many areas, including infection rates, maternity care and the capacity to prevent medication errors based on 2018 data. The award follows Henderson Hospital's "A" Hospital Safety Grade, also from The Leapfrog Group, last fall.

Wound care specialists to the rescue

He went to see a vascular doctor who explained the valves in his veins weren't working properly, causing the blood to build up in his legs and his left calf to swell. "I had a lot of pain," he recalls. "It actually kept me up at night."

A procedure was needed to treat his veins, but before that could be done, the wound near his ankle would have to be healed. He learned about the Wound Care and Hyperbaric Medicine program at Summerlin Hospital and was immediately impressed by the caring and professional treatment he received. "They were very knowledgeable. They knew exactly what to do."

His doctor, Maria Habbi, MD, explains that a team approach is used to address the underlying cause of the problem and optimize the whole health of each patient. "An important part of Thomas' comprehensive care involved compression to control the swelling and support healing."

As his wound went away, so did the pain, and he was able to look forward to being active again. "It's to the point where I could jump up in the air and click my heels," he says.

"I've been so comfortable with them," he adds, remarking on how he was reassured by everyone on the team – from the receptionist to the nurses to the doctor.

He hadn't heard of specialized wound care before, but now he stresses it's something people should know about. "They've done such a fabulous job helping me. It's fantastic."



39+ Weeks Quality Improvement Program

The Birthplaces at Centennial Hills, Henderson, Spring Valley and Summerlin hospitals have each received the March of Dimes award for their work to eliminate elective deliveries before infants' 39 weeks gestational age. "Sometimes there is a medical reason to induce labor before 39 weeks," explained Dr. McBride. "Otherwise, babies born before then might have health problems or need to remain in the hospital for a longer time."

The arrival of a new baby is an exciting time, and one that may be filled with many questions. What should I expect during childbirth? What should I know about breastfeeding? Which hospital can best address the needs of my baby and me? Will my doctor be there for my delivery? >

"Our Birthplaces focus on the safe birthing experience for mothers and babies with initial skin-to-skin contact for bonding, education and care of the newborn, breastfeeding support, safe sleeping techniques and understanding shaken baby syndrome," said Dan McBride, Chief Medical Officer for The Valley Health System (VHS).

Many parents will never see the behind-the-scenes work each Birthplace team undertakes to ensure a safe delivery. Centennial Hills, Henderson, Spring Valley and Summerlin hospitals all follow safety initiatives and operate a system-wide high reliability unit, which has multiple systems in place to achieve a safe mother-baby experience. This includes performing drills for various neonatal and maternal emergencies, such as what to do if a baby's head or shoulder is stuck, a mother is bleeding or the baby experiences breathing difficulties.

Each Birthplace also has round-the-clock laborist coverage. A laborist provides obstetric coverage within the hospital, and delivers babies when the patient's obstetrician isn't available, responds to emergencies and assists with high-risk deliveries.

After delivery, each Birthplace encourages parents to participate in the "golden hour" to promote the baby's growth and development. During the first hour immediately after birth, parents bond with their infant through skin-to-skin-contact. This golden hour of contact helps babies have greater success with breastfeeding and also helps regulate their blood sugar and body temperature.

Experience with high-risk births

Women experiencing pregnancy complications, such as premature labor or pregnancy-induced high-blood pressure along with another complication, may spend time in the antepartum unit, where specially trained nurses monitor both baby and mother. For high-risk deliveries, there may be multiple teams in the delivery room – one for the mother and another for the baby. Centennial Hills, Spring Valley and Summerlin hospitals have Level III neonatal intensive care units (NICUs), and Henderson Hospital opened a Level II NICU in 2018.



Sepsis is a life-threatening medical emergency that strikes at least 1.7 million adults in America each year.* It occurs when the body has an extreme response to an infection, causing changes in the circulatory system that can rapidly lead to tissue damage, organ failure and death. Sepsis may be associated with any kind of infection – from pneumonia or a urinary tract infection to a nicked cuticle or a diabetes-related wound.

One of the biggest challenges is identifying sepsis early and getting treatment right away. To help patients get the critical care they need, Spring Valley Hospital is working hard to educate the community, and recently earned The Joint Commission's Gold Seal of Approval® for Sepsis Certification, demonstrating its commitment to providing safe and effective care.

"It is our goal and our expectation to identify patients and begin treatment with antibiotics within an hour," says Sepsis Coordinator Gina Abato, MSN, RN. She refers to that critical time period as the "magic hour." Certain tests, such as measuring levels of lactic acid, can be indicators for sepsis, but any time a patient comes in with certain warning signs, such as breathing fast or with a fever, the emergency team immediately jumps into action.

"We have a code for sepsis that is paged through the hospital," Abato says. "Doctors go straight to that room and begin taking care of the patient immediately. We have proven that we can improve outcomes for our community."

Anyone can get sepsis, but those at greater risk include older people, children younger than one, and people with weakened immune systems or chronic medical conditions such as diabetes, lung disease, cancer and kidney disease.

To recognize the warning signs, learn the TIME acronym*:

- Temperature Higher or lower than normal
- Infection May have signs and symptoms of an infection
- M Mental decline Confused, sleepy, difficult to rouse
- **E** Extremely ill "I feel like I might die," severe pain or discomfort

Get medical care IMMEDIATELY if you suspect sepsis or have an infection that's not getting better or is getting worse. Time matters.

Sepsis survivor: "I was shaking uncontrollably."

For Shirley Chipman, the first sign of sepsis started at 2 a.m. while she was visiting Las Vegas with her husband and daughter. She remembers waking up shaking, feeling like she was freezing but also burning up with a fever. At first, she thought it might be related to her diabetes, but she quickly realized she needed emergency care.

She was taken to Spring Valley Hospital where she was promptly

diagnosed with sepsis and given emergency treatment with intravenous antibiotics. "The thing that impressed me the most was just the caring, careful attention," she says. Thanks to swift medical attention, she was able return home after a few days of inpatient care. "If I hadn't gone to the hospital, it could have been very serious," she says.

Fighting opioid abuse with a secure way to dispose of unused drugs

The team at The Valley Health System is committed to keeping you comfortable when you need specialty treatment, but also recognizes the potential dangers of prescription opioids. While pain-reducing medications may be prescribed as needed, extra care is being taken to ensure that unused prescriptions don't fall into the wrong hands and put others at risk.

To support this effort, The Valley Health System has collaborated with the Rx Abuse Leadership Initiative (RALI) of Nevada to provide home disposal kits that you can use when you're done taking a medication as prescribed by your doctor. The kits provide a safe and easy way to dispose of unused pain medications and other prescription drugs, and prevent others from accessing them. This is one of a number of ways The Valley Health System is working to help protect you and your family.

Desert Springs Hospital received America's 100 Best Hospitals for Coronary Intervention Award from Healthgrades. Desert Springs Hospital also earned recognition status with the Nurses Improving Care for Healthsystem Elders, a nursing education and consultation program focused on the care of older adults.

Expanding to meet your needs

Centennial Hills Hospital is in the process of adding a five-story patient tower that will add 56 beds to the facility. Phase one will add capacity in the areas of labor & delivery, neonatal intensive care, medical/ surgical, intermediate medical, and intensive care units at an estimated cost of \$95 million.

Training the **DOCTORS OF TOMORROW**

Expanded residency training programs are now available through the newly accredited Valley Health System Graduate Medical Education Consortium. The training programs will help attract high-quality, highly competent medical residents to the region. According to the Consortium's Chief Academic Officer Andrew M. Eisen, MD, FAAP, there is a tremendous need for healthcare professionals thanks to the growing

population in southern Nevada. "We're making big investments in the future of healthcare in southern Nevada," he says. "The strongest predictor of where someone will start their practice is where they finish their training."

The first new residencies to be added include a fiveyear General Surgery program and a three-year Family Medicine program. Both will begin in July and will provide an opportunity for medical school graduates to continue their education while practicing under the supervision of attending physicians.

Dr. Eisen notes that residents in the new programs will experience different Valley Health System hospitals and work with a diverse patient population. They will also have opportunities to participate in scholarly research, develop leadership skills, and broaden their professional experience at other facilities in the region, depending on their area of focus. "We have the opportunity to design the programs around what the residents need and the experiences that are of value to them," Dr. Eisen says.

For patients, having residents contributing to their care can mean an even better overall experience with more collaboration. Residents don't replace what the attending staff does, they add to it. Being a teaching hospital, Dr. Eisen says, inspires an environment where there is always a push to stay on top of what's new and provide the best possible care.

WHAT MAKES OUR PROGRAMS SPECIAL?

Our diverse faculty members, modern facilities and integrated health system provide a unique opportunity for residents to support patient care across a broad scope of specialties. Also, working with community partners and having access to advanced technology provide compelling pathways to develop critical clinical competencies. These include using advanced simulation equipment to practice real-world decisionmaking and manual skills in a consequence-free environment. Additionally, a video-based training program will give surgical residents an opportunity to record their teaching cases and have them reviewed by local faculty and international experts, taking their experience beyond southern Nevada to a global community.

How can a hospitalist ease your hospital stay?



Being admitted to the hospital can be scary, and you want to know you will be well cared for,

whether you have a medical need, a question or just need reassurance. The hospitalist is a licensed practitioner whose primary professional focus is caring for patients while they are in the hospital. Here, internal medicine physician Jennifer Raroque, MD, explains more about their important role.

Q. How are hospitalists trained and assigned?

Most commonly, hospitalists are physicians trained in internal medicine or family medicine. They can also be advance practice registered nurses or physician assistants under the direct supervision of physicians. The Valley Health System has chosen a group of hospitalists to care for patients based on a track record of efficiency, quality and patient satisfaction. Alternatively, your health plan or primary care provider may choose a hospitalist for you.

Q. What is their role in providing care?

Your hospitalist will see you every day to direct your treatment while you are in the hospital, answer questions you or your family may have, and attend to any emergencies that may arise. He or she may consult other doctors to participate in your care and will arrange for any prescriptions you may need when you are discharged.

Q. Will your hospitalist communicate with your primary care provider?

Yes. Your primary care provider and hospitalist communicate with each other during your hospitalization to coordinate your care. There will be a written or verbal sign-out regarding your hospital course and recommendations for follow-up care on discharge. You will not have an appointment to see the hospitalist after discharge; however, you may contact him or her if you have any questions about your hospital stay.

Q. What are the advantages of having a hospitalist?

Hospitalists spend all of their workday in the hospital; therefore, they can provide for more focused care and be readily available if a need arises. Many studies have shown this improves quality of care and efficiency.* Implementation of a hospitalist program decreases cost of care and length of hospital stay for the patient, while improving quality and patient satisfaction.
